1. INTRODUCTION

- A brief report of the Baptist Union Education Services PNG is prepared for Baptist National Executive Board.
- The report covers the work done by BUPNG, achievements, plans, and challenges.

2.BAPTIST EDUCATION OFFICE

• The Baptist Education office is staffed with;

Heather Mapusia (Adult Literacy Coordinator, **Joy Jack** (Finance Officer) and **Pepa Bala** (the Education officer) currently on a/Manager position.

• There are three field officer positions namely Western Highlands Baptist Education Field Officer, Enga Baptist Education Field Officer based in Kompiam and Min Baptist Education Field Officer based in Telefomin, Sandaun Province. Of the three Field Officer positions, All position remains unfilled due to financial constraints as a result of budget cuts by our major partner, DFAT through Church Partnership Program (CPP). However, the future sustenance of these positions remains uncertain.

LEM PHONICS TRAINING

- It is phonics training in partnership with Light Education Ministries, Australia. It's a complete package in comparison with other phonics .Baptist Union PNG has a partnership agreement with its partner and the agreement training in phonics has been delivered to grade 1-3 teachers to assist in bridging of English in Primary schools.
- This will help the students to their reading, writing and speaking learnt skills. Now that SBC curriculum is introduced this program will assist our teachers. Apart from our lead Literacy Coordinator (Heather Mapusia) who is our lead facilitator, we have three other Trainer of Trainers(Grace Hickie, Lassie Pyare, and Misi Mumu)

Christian Religious Education (CRE)

- Christian Religious Education is a mandatory subject for the agency schools. Baptist Education Agency has a Department of Education approved CRE syllabus from Elementary to Grade 10.
- Although the Department of Education has introduced the new Citizenship and Christian Values Education (CCVE), CRE is still taught complementing the CCVE.

Placement of School Welfare Officers/Chaplains

- Chaplains are important for Baptist Agency schools. Although we do not have many trained persons few schools have been engaged with chaplains including Kumbareta Secondary and Lumusa high schools.
- This has helped helped instill discipline in schools for both teachers and students.

Teachers Conference

- Baptist Education continue to host teachers conference for the agency schools. We have plan in place to host a four days conference for Baptist teachers in April 2024 school year at CLTC.
- Series of workshops will be held during the day to address teachers professional development by way of in-service and night fellowships to enhance their spiritual lives. Our partners from MAF have offered to assist in running on teachers professional development.

1. Adult Literacy Training

- Adult Literacy Training is one of the important programs to improve literacy rate in PNG. Baptist Union through Education services plays that important role in the communities.
- Baptist Education has a partnership agreement with ADRA (Adventist Development Relief Agency) when BUPNG in partnership produced and published the national Adult literacy training Curriculum.
- Baptist Education has trained 32 trainer of Trainers so far.
- These trainers have then trained 74 trainers in Western Highland, Jiwaka, Eastern Highland, Morobe, Enga and Southern Highland provinces. There are 8 adult Literacy schools established in these provinces.
- Thirty-two (32) learners from Western Highlands graduated in December 2022 and the Australian High Commission was the official guest.
- There will be another 5 more graduations in different location expected to be happen early next year 3024.

International schools

- Baptist Union has two international schools, Highlands Christian Grammar and Kompiam Inter. Recruitment of volunteer expatriate teachers is a big challenge for the agency.
- Recruitment of expatriate teachers is a challenge and need support from NDOE and our Missionary Partners such as Baptist Mission Australia. We have so far partnered well with MAF and that is on contract basis.

7. FINANCE REPORT

- Baptist Education struggles financially every year
- Only source of income is agency fees which many schools don't faithfully pay
- Education Act 1983 parents supposed to pay Agency Fees but with GTFS policy parents have ceased to pay.
- Grant In Aid have never been paid to church agencies in the past 10 plus years. This year we received only K5000.
- The available funds are often used for operational costs.
- Other education projects adult literacy training, head teachers meetings and education board meeting are funded by CPP.
- Schools Financial records are kept separately and acquittals are done bi-annually.
- School principals submit their recepts for acquittals after expanding their fund requests. The cheque requestions for each transaction are kept at agency office.
- Each school are required to keep CCB & other financial records.
- Baptist education assists in providing financial reports for each schools board and P & C meetings.

8. CHALLENGES

- **8.1 Finance** agency continues to face shortfall in financial support
- **8.2 MOU** Signing of MOU with Enga, Sandaun and Eastern Highland Province remains a challenge and need support from our partners.
- **8.3 Expatriate Teachers** recruitment of expatriate teachers is a challenge and need support from NDOE and our Missionary Partners such as Baptist Mission Australia. We have so far partnered well with MAF and that is on contract basis.
- **8.4 ECE** Baptist Education is in the process of clustering centres. Awareness in communities is a challenge,
- **8.5 -166 Structure** implementation of 166 structures for Baptist agency schools with require mapping and planning in partnership with respective Provincial Education Division
- 8.6 SBC Schools are struggling to receive SBC materials
- **8.7 NCEC Secretariat** Baptist Education remains committed to supporting establishing of NCEC Secretariat.
- **8.8 Provincial CESs** Baptist Education need funding support to establish Provincial Church Education Offices.

9. RECOMMENDATION

- **9.1 Chaplains** BUPNG Ministry Team strategize with its local unions to assist in providing chaplains to primary schools.
- **9.2 Baptist Teachers Conference** Provincial Education Division assist in the conference by providing workshops on topics such as SBC and 166 restructure.
- **9.3 Expatriate Teachers** Baptist Union communicate with partners in overseas to identify ways to support recruitment of expatriate teachers.
- **9.4 Proposed Teachers College** Establish communication and form working committee
- **9.5 TVET Centre** Baptist Education Board to endorse establishment of the proposed TVET centre
- **9.6 FODE Centre** Baptist Education Board endorse the establishment of FODE Centre
- **9.7 Reviewed Baptist Schools Finance Policy** Baptist Education Board endorse reviewed Finance Policy
- **High and Secondary School Board Policies** Baptist Education Board endorse the Board of Governors policy for high and secondary schools.
